Print Critique

Claudia Peterson returned for one of the club's most popular programs. This was the third time she attended one of our meetings to comment on member photos. She is an experienced photographer who has been involved in competitions and has won several awards. She analyzed thirty photos submitted by members, and her practiced eye caught many things less experienced photographers might have missed.

People read left to right, so use elements that will lead the

- thing big or dark. With landscapes, include an interesting object in the foreground.
- Avoid bright lights around the edges.
- Avoid bright spots that detract from the main subject.
- Weight the bottom of the photo with darker tones.
- Diagonal lines add interest.
- Simple images have the most impact; move in close or crop.

Colors that are opposites on the color wheel are most effective: blue & Orange, red & green, purple & yellow. Red is the most dramatic color.



- Use the whitest mat possible. (Cresent #918)
- If using a colored mat, choose a color that is in the photograph.
- Odd is more interesting than even.
- When using foliage to frame the subject, use more than just a few twigs.

Shoot-outs are a great way to meet other members of the club and photograph locations you might not visit on your own. **Any member may organize a shoot-out.** Just pick a place you'd like to photograph and invite others to join you by posting the time & place information on the Yahoo Forum, or announcing it at a meeting.


