Shooting macro often involves "wet-belly photography. Ground cloths, water-proof shoes & pants and kneepads can help.

Macro Photography

Barbi Kutilek is one excellent example of the very talented members we have in the club. Her presentation on Macro Photography was one of the best programs of the year. Did you know that, although the distinction is somewhat blurred, close up photography is not the same as macro? Macro means that the subject is depicted at life size (1:1) or larger.



Although special equipment is available, everyone can shoot macro photos. Most point & shoot cameras have a macro mode which shortens the minimum focusing distance. SLR cameras have more options, including dedicated macro lenses, diopters, extension tubes, teleconverters, bellows extensions and reversing rings.

Dedicated macro lenses range from 50mm to 200mm. A shorter lens al-

lows the shooter to move in very close to the subject. A longer lens provides more working room. Barbi suggests you borrow or rent a macro lens before purchasing one. They can be expensive.

> Other accessories that will help ensure macro success include a tripod, remote shutter release, right angle viewer and focusing rail. And as Barbi demonstrated, a diffuser is helpful in eliminating harsh light and contrast. There is no end to the amount of money you can spend on photographic accessories.

Barbi also suggests that to create a more interesting photo-

graph, look for the uncommon point of view (See "wet-belly photography" in the sidebar), and isolate details of patterns and textures. You may get a beautiful abstract work of art.








Shoot-outs




