# Getting the Right Exposure

Photography is all about light, and getting the right exposure is a matter of manipulating the amount of light that reaches the camera's sensor. **George Ziegler** made an informative presentation on how to use the camera's controls (on both DSLR and Point & Shoot) to allow in just the right amount of light. The mount of light that is let into the camera is determined by aperture and shutter speed.

**Aperture**: the variable opening by which light enters the camera **Shutter Speed**: the length of time the aperture is allowed to stay open.

The photographer may choose how much control to give to the camera and how much to keep.



In **Program Mode** the computer in the camera will choose the aperture opening (f-stop) and the shutter speed. The photographer only has to compose and press the shutter release button. In **Aperture Priority**, the photographer sets the f-stop and the camera chooses the "correct" shutter speed.

In **Shutter Speed Priority**, the photographer sets the shutter speed and the camera sets the "correct" f-stop.

In **Manual Mode**, the photographer has full control to set both the f-stop and the shutter speed.

With most Point & Shoot cameras, the camera will choose the exposure, although the photographer has some control by choosing one of the icons. A **sports icon** will set a fast shutter speed to stop the action. A **landscape icon** will set a low f-stop for greater depth of field. A **night icon** will set a slower shutter speed to allow in more light. Most P&Ss have a catalog of available icons.

## Mind Over Meter

Did you notice that in the main text, the word "correct" is incased in parentheses?

This is because what the camera deems as the "correct" exposure may not be what the photographer wants.

A DSLR has three ways to determine the "correct" exposure. When the shutter release button is pressed, information is passed to the in-camera computer. The photographer may choose how the camera collects this information by choosing one of three metering modes.

With **Spot Metering**, information from a very small area of the whole picture is used.

With **Matrix Metering**, information is taken from a wide area of the picture. **Center Weighted Metering** is similar to matrix, except the information in the center of the picture is given added import.

**Exposure Compensation** is a control the photographer may use to override the exposure that the camera chooses as "correct." Usually set with one half or one third f-stop increments, the photographer may easily add or subtract exposure for a given photo.

If working in Manual Mode, the exposure may also be modified by changing the f-stop or the shutter speed.


