Focus Groups Review

Back in May 2010, the executive board brainstormed ways to better meet the diversified needs and interests of the club membership, which was growing at a turbo rate. The one hour, once a month, informational program could not possibly cover all the things the members indicated they wanted to learn. The board decided to establish Special Interest Groups (later re-named "Focus Groups") An hour prior to the June 2010 general meeting, four groups met for the first time: Macro, PS Elements, Lightroom and People Photography. Night photography was added in September. At the January meeting we all found out what these groups have been doing for the past six months.



Macro Photography: **Susan Brazelton** explained that a macro photograph is one in which the subject is life-size or larger (on a 4x6 print). She described and displayed some of the various lenses and accessories (such as extension tubes, teleconverters, focusing rails, reversing rings and magnifying lenses) that are available for macro photography. This group does not hold regular meetings. Instead they schedule macro specific shoot-outs, where members share and learn from each other.

Lightroom: **George Ziegler** facilitates the Adobe Lightroom group, which meets the third Thursday of each month. The group has learned how key words and collections can be used to organize photos; how the tools in the Develop Module are used to enhance and strengthen a photo; and how to print a single photo or a contact sheet. George also pointed out that photos may be posted to Facebook, Flickr and Smugmug directly from Lightroom.



Photoshop Elements: **Roy Hovey** facilitates this group which meets once a month, alternating between a computer lab in south San Jose and a member's home. This group has been following the lessons in 100 Tips & Tricks for Photoshop Elements (Visual Learning Systems). They have practiced using the selection tools and applying filters and masks, and are now starting to learn about layers.



Photographing People: **Noella Vigeant** described this group's work on using exposure compensation, both in camera and with a flash. She showed a series of photos that demonstrated how fill flash lightens up shadowed faces. Their current project is to continue practicing with fill flash and to use a diffuser to bounce light.

Night Photography: **Noël Calvi** explained the Top Ten Hints for night photography and showed photos taken at the several night shoot-outs the group has held: Fremont Peak, Holiday Lights, and San Francisco

The Creative Corner with j johnny

C= Camera, Creativity, Critique

“Wow! That’s a great photo; you must have a really good camera.” Hmm..so all great food is prepared in really good pots? A good tool will only take you so far. To hit your artistic mark takes developing your artistic eye. Let’s start with a game.

This game is called camera. Playing camera requires two people, one to play the role of the photographer and one to play the camera. The game starts by the two people standing one in front of the other as photographers stand with their cameras held in front. Photographers place their hands on the shoulders of their cameras. Cameras have their eyes closed to mimic a closed shutter. Photographers gently move the shoulders of their camera to point in a direction that the photographer thinks would make a desired photograph. Photographers tap the shoulder of their camera. The camera opens its eyes to mimic an open shutter. Photographers silently count to three then tap the shoulder of the camera which re-closes its eyes. Photographers then review the image by asking the camera what it saw. Repeat this twice more and then switch roles. You may also try placing the camera in a chair to alter the height or to gently tilt the head of the camera to alter the angle of the view.

By comparing what the photographers had in their mind’s eye when they pointed the camera with what the camera says it saw may help you develop your ability to see different points of view and help you establish your favorite points of view. Try that game both indoors and outdoors. The more you play that game the more quickly you will be able to see what in a given scene attracts your eye. That attraction is a subject matter or focal point that may be close to your creative eye. Now let’s further develop that eye.

C= Composition, Creativity

The next time you use your camera, experiment with composition bracketing. In simple terms, if you take the first image of the scene in a landscape format, turn the camera 90 degrees and take the same scene in a portrait format. That would be one bracket. A second bracket is to take the first image and then either zoom in or zoom out or move closer or further away. Now you have 3 images, 2 images at the original focal length one in landscape and one in portrait and then at least one more image at a wider or narrower focal length (further, closer).

C=Critique

When you review the images your internal creative eye is giving it a critique. “The photographer’s eye is perpetually evaluating. A photographer can bring coincidence of line simply by moving his head a fraction of a millimeter. He can modify perspectives by a slight bending of the knees. By placing the camera closer to or further from the subject, he draws a detail – and it can be subordinated, or he can be tyrannized by it. But he composes a picture in very nearly the same amount of time it takes to click the shutter, at the speed of a reflex action.”

Start to observe what you like about each image and what you want to avoid. Were the wide shots too wide or did that added width set a more agreeable tone? Did the image work better to satisfy your aims in the portrait or landscape format?

C=Color

The final step is to remove the color. Take those three or four images and convert them to black & white or grayscale, depending upon the terminology you find most appropriate. That removal of the color will help you focus on the shapes, forms, and textures in the image. Convert some past images to grayscale and continue to critique yourself as to how well you have done in meeting the vision of your creative eye. If the images are off the mark, is it technical, e.g., too bright, too dark, poor focus, improper depth of field, or is the reason one of creative vision? Both technique and vision improve with practice, but vision will only improve by you looking at your images and comparing them to the vision of your inner eye.

“A photographer who wants to see, a photographer who wants to make fine images, must recognize the value of the familiar. Your ability to see is not increased by the distance you put between yourself and your home. If you do not see what is around you every day, what will you see when you go to Tangiers? The subject matter may be different, but unless you can get to the essence of the subject matter through keen observation, and express it through your photographs, it doesn't matter how esoteric your locale.”

Photo Tip

As a general rule, using the camera's Delete button to eliminate unwanted photos is a bad idea. Why?

- It drains your camera battery
- The camera LCD is too small to effectively evaluate whether a photo should be discarded.
- If you accidentally delete a photo from your memory card, you will need a photo recovery program to retrieve it.

Better idea:

- Transfer all your photos to your computer, back up, and then delete.
- After your photos are backed-up, format the memory card in the camera
