

Print Share

As at every meeting, we started off with a print sharing session. This is our way of immediately including new members and guests in the club's very social atmosphere. It is wonderful to have an opportunity to show photos to other photographers, but the real benefit of print sharing is that it gives members and guests an opportunity to get to know each other.

Manipulating Light



After watching a 15 minute video on the use of reflectors to manipulate the light, Noella shows an example. With a Five-in-One Reflector set, the diffuser she is holding comes with two two-sided covers: gold & silver, and white & a gold-silver combination. These allow the photographer to add warmth, direct light into shadows, and soften glare. The circles are available in various sizes and fold into a small carry case.

The program in January consisted of three parts: a review of the main features of the club's website; an explanation of white balance, including the common white balance icons on most cameras; and the use of reflectors and a diffuser to control light.

What's the Big Deal with White Balance?

George Ziegler took the attending members and guests through an explanation of the importance of white balance and how to get it right.



White is not always “white.” Some whites have a yellow cast and some a blue. If you get the correct white in your exposure, all the other colors will fall into line. To control white balance, you can adjust by choosing one of the icons on your camera: sunny, cloudy, shade, florescent, or tungsten. Or you can set it to automatic (A) and let the camera decide. Shooting in RAW format gives the photographer the fullest control of white balance because the data can be adjusted in a computer. If shooting in jpeg, the white balance is set in the camera and further adjustments are limited. The use of a grey card or ExpoDisc are two excellent methods for setting the correct white balance.

They also experimented with the flash meter, noting how the readings changed when the backdrop was changed to white. The February meeting will feature editing.

Flickr Theme Projects

The Flickr Theme Projects were established at the very first club meeting in April 2008. This group now has 111 members and over 2,700 photos have been posted. Members choose the twelve themes for each year and then the board creates the monthly calendar. Each club member may post up to five photos for each theme. Although interpretation of the themes is left up to individuals, inquiries have prompted this extended explanation of some of the 2011 themes.

March: Silhouettes - Backlighting is needed here so the main subject becomes a dark shape.

April: Special Effects - No straight forward photographs here. Either in the camera or in the computer, change an ordinary photo subject into something surreal, uncanny, unearthly, weird, dreamlike, psychedelic, or magical. (These photos may then be submitted to the spring gallery show, "*Altered Reality*")

May: Stormy Weather - So far our winter has been pretty mild, but let's look for lightening strikes, hail stones, rain and thunder clouds. Don't stay inside where it's warm, grab your gear and get out there in the tempest. (Stay safe: no umbrellas if there is lightening)

June: Doors - The portals that lead us in and out of buildings

July: City Lights - The night Focus Group will be organizing several after dark shoots. We'll keep you posted.

August: Street Scenes - No looking up at skyscrapers this month. Photograph the nitty-gritty, or beauty, of what you see at street level.

September: Out of Town - In this case, "town" is Morgan Hill. Post photos of any place or thing that is at least 50 miles away.

October: Fences - Self-explanatory

November: Alphabet - Photograph shapes that look like letters of the alphabet. DO NOT PHOTOGRAPH ACTUAL LETTERS. We purposefully put this one at the end of the year so everyone would have plenty of time to find their letters. Every time you go out and soot, look for letters in nature, gates, objects around the house, cloud formations, etc. You get extra credit if you spell your name and double extra credit if you photograph the entire alphabet.

December: Seasons - Winter, Spring, Summer, Fall

Editor's note: Marty Cheek writes an occasional column for this newsletter. This month he acquaints us with photographer **Robert Mapplethorpe** and the San Jose exhibit of some of his early portraits. (All club members are invited to write a column for *In Focus*. It's safe to say that one of the photography world's most controversial artists is Robert Mapplethorpe. With his sexually provocative images that have caused religious and conservative groups to criticize him for "pandering obscenity," Mapplethorpe is a photographer who stirs a storm of debate.

Mapplethorpe gained wide national attention with a show of his prints that was set to open in June 1989 at the Corcoran Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. That show, called "The Perfect Moment," shocked museum board members and members of Congress with its explicit images of homosexual eroticism. The show was funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, and created an intense debate in print and airwaves at the time about using government money to fund sexually explicit prints for public viewing. The Corcoran show was cancelled, but "The Perfect Moment" soon after opened at the Washington Project for the Arts. The scandal brought in large crowds to view the images.

The San Jose Museum of Art recently opened up an exhibit of his portraits from the 1970s and 1980s that does not contain his sexually explicit works. Mapplethorpe photographed a large number of people – including celebrities such as Richard Gere, Grace Jones, Peter Gabriel and Deborah Harry. A print he made of Andy Warhol in 1987 sold for \$643,200, the ninth most expensive photograph in history.

The portraits now showing at SJMA give viewers a visual of New York City during the 1970s and the 1980s. They reflect the artistic and theatrical effervescence vitality of the city's cultural milieu.

Mapplethorpe got his start in photography with a Polaroid camera in the mid-1960s. A decade later, he moved on to a Hasselblad medium-format camera. He is known for his highly-stylized black and white portraits but he also took photos of flowers, especially orchids. He died on March 9, 1989 at age 42 from complications from AIDS.




