## **February Meeting**

Have you noticed that the number of people attending the general meetings has increased? Two years ago the average attendance hovered around forty-two. Now we routinely have sixty-plus people at every meeting.

**Print Share:** What more can be said about print share? It energizes the start of every meeting. People have an immediate opportunity to socialize by sharing a favorite photo and offering comments about others' photos. And in the process, we all learn something about one another. Even those who don't have a print are included in the conversations. No one is ever left out. As you can see from these photos, sharing photographs is fun.























## "Shutter Speed"

In planning the February program, Program Chair **Noella Vigeant**, took advantage of the sizable Hiram Morgan Hill Room at the Community & Cultural Center (CCC) to set up three stations where people could learn about and practice manipulating shutter speed.

**How Slow Can You Go?** Hand holding the camera (no tripod), what is the slowest shutter speed you can use and still get a clear shot? Although the *rule of thumb* is: *choose a shutter speed with a denominator that is larger than the focal length of the lens* (50mm lens = 1/60th of a second;

200mm lens = 1/250th of a second), in practice, a shutter speed that works for one photographer may result in blur for another. With the help of **Michael Sue BrownKorbel** and her assistants,



Rodney Myatt, Noël Calvi, and Bob BrownKorbel, participants tried shooting a low-light subject (the lamp) at various shutter speeds to determine which produced the clearest picture.



With the ingenious use of a laser beam attached to the camera and a target on the wall, everyone had an opportunity to improve hand-holding techniques and graphically see improvement.









## **Steady Your Shot**

- Pull your elbows tight into your body
- Exhale completely before pressing the shutter button
- Steady your stance by placing your feet shoulder width apart and one foot slightly ahead of the other.
- Lean against a solid object like a wall or tree
- Sit or kneel

**Rear Sync Flash (aka: rear-curtain sync): Larry Campbell** and **Duane Middlebusher** explained how to achieve a special effect by combining flash with a slow shutter speed. Using rear-sync flash creates a stream of light behind a moving subject (the flash fires right at the end of the exposure). With a large format camera, Larry demonstrated exactly

how the curtain worked.

**Long Exposure Special Effects:** With assistance from **Lance Trott**, **George Ziegler** explained how to use the "bulb" setting for exposures longer than thirty seconds. He held everyone's attention when he twirled his light sticks to paint the dark. Those with a zoom lens learned how to create an exploding special effect by turning the lens (zooming) *during* a several second exposure.









After everyone had *not quite enough time* to learn and practice, the group-as-a-whole reconvened to share their practice photos and ask the main presenters a few additional questions.

**iPhoneography** (Droids Welcome): Are you getting the most out of your smartphone camera? In this group members will explore the basics of taking photos (including choosing the focus point and controlling the exposure); creating albums; buying apps (both shooting and editing); and applying artistic enhancements and special effects.

**Photo Critique:** Would you like to receive constructive criticism on your photos? This group will meet to analyze what makes a great photo: possibly by comparing two versions of the same subject; exploring how to get the most effective crop; and evaluating color combinations. Resources may include a competition judge, advanced photographers, online articles, and workshops.

## **People Power**

This club runs on *People Power*. If no one contributed his or her time, expertise, talents, or knowledge, nothing would happen: no shoot-outs, no Focus Groups, no Flickr sites; just a bunch of befuddled photographers floundering around wondering what to do and where to go.

## How are you going to become more involved and support the success of your club?

- **1. Join a Focus Group:** As the club grew in size, focus groups were established so members could delve more deeply into a particular area of interest. The groups also allow members to learn and get to know each other in a small-group setting.
- **2. Participate in a shoot-out** and offer to drive a carpool: another excellent way to learn and get to know other members.
- 3. **Join the Gallery Show Committee:** Help plan and administer gallery shows: meets four time a year.
- **4. Join the Shoot-out Committee:** Plan and possibly lead a club shoot-out to one of your favorite locations: meets four times a year.
- **5. Create a club float for the Fourth of July Parade:** Could be as simple as a convertible car or a pick-up truck full of photographers. Coordinate the decorating and direct the participants. Many people would help. What fun this would be!
- 6. Arrange for local businesses (coffee shops, restaurants, offices,) to display member photos. This is a priority!
- **7. Organize community service projects** that would link our club with low-income families, senior facilities, and public service projects.
- **8.** Create a connection with local schools to support young photographers. This might lead to a high school auxiliary club, a scholarship program, or monetary/supplies support for school photography programs.
- **9. Join the Executive Board** as Second Vice President. Job description includes attending the board meetings (7-9PM on the second Wednesday of the month), help with planning the monthly programs, and assist with other activities as needed. Every meeting includes laughter.
- **10. Help set up before the general meetings:** move tables and chairs, arrange name badges, and distribute materials.
- **11. Assist at the sign-in table:** greet and assist guests by offering information about the club and answering questions.
- **12. Create your own club project:** Whatever your interest might be, the members of the Executive Board will help.

## Teen Photography Workshop


