March Featured Photographer - Ken Brown

photography is contagious. He graciously shared examples of his most recent work, which included landscapes, local scenes, and smiling people.





"HDR Photography"

High Dynamic Range

The camera sensor is limited in the range of light it can capture (usually 5 to 7 stops). When the range is too great for the camera, the photographer must make a decision: detail in the light or detail in the shadow. Sometimes a graduated neutral density filter is enough to even out the light. When it isn't, the photographer can take a series of photos, each with a different exposure, and combine them into one image using HDR software. Local photographer **Scott Schilling** explained how.

First he emphasized that the best way to get sharp photos is to minimize camera vibration by using a tripod, a cable release, and mirror lock-up. Shooting in manual mode, once he has his composition, he sets his focus

point (approximately 1/3 of the distance into the photo), decides on the best the aperture (usually f10 to f22), and then takes multiple shots, altering each exposure by changing the shutter speed.

Depending on the range of light he is trying to capture, he will take three to five photos in one stop increments. This can be done in single shot mode or if the camera is set on auto-bracket, one click of the shutter will produce a quick succession of shots.



Although there are others, the two software programs that Scott described are **Photomatix** and **Nik HDR Efex Pro**. Both are user friendly, and Scott claimed that in about an hour a new user could be well on his/her way to becoming an expert.

Although each program works essentially the same way (merging multiple photos into one image), the Nik program has control points that can select portions of the merged photo to adjust exposure, contrast and saturation. With Photomatix such adjustments are global.

With Photomatix, you have the opportunity to select a specific section of one photo and the soft-ware will automatically make layer adjustments so the selected section is in the final image. (For example, if you think that the river currents in one photo look better than in the others, you can select the river portion of that one photo for the final, merged image.)

Both programs work as stand-alone programs or as plug-ins for Photoshop, Elements, Lightroom and Aperture. Nik takes significantly longer to process a HDR image than Photomatix.

Workflow

Scott shoots all photos in RAW to have as much data as possible to work with. He first merges the bracketed photos into one HDR image and then processes it just like he would any image; sharpening, adjusting saturation, adding clarity, etc. He saves the image as a TIFF, which retains all the data (a jpg will compress the file, thus losing data).



Scott works closely with **Don Smith** and offered these discounts codes for ordering software.



Editor's Note: **Marty Cheek**, a columnist for the *Morgan Hill Times*, writes an occasional column for *In Focus*. This month he introduces us to **Walker Evans** whose depression-era photographs are on display at Stanford University. (All club members are invited to write a guest column for *In Focus*.

Walker Evans Exhibit at Stanford's Cantor Center

Walker Evans wanted to be a writer. That's what led him into photography. He learned that a photograph is a story – a tale of the moment told visually. And a photograph, like a good story, draws its audience into its world, making you see the drama of the moment, making you feel the emotions of the characters, and making you awaken to a fresh perspective of the world.

Take a look at the photographs that Evans took during the Great Depression when he got a job for the New Deal's Farm Security Administration as a roving social historian. He captured in his camera stark images of work-worn sharecroppers, families living in grim poverty, the sad, lonely, empty streets of small-town America – his photos depict a sad nation in a state of losing confidence in its destiny.




Evan's images also tell a story about who we are as a people. His 1936 photograph "Alabama Tenant Farmer" shows a man in overalls and curly hair staring at you with a look of lost hope, and yet, in his eyes is the defiance of a fighter who will persevere.



"Main Street Block, Selma, Alabama" shows an Edward Hopper-like view of a row of rundown businesses in a Southern state, empty of pedestrians, waiting for a promise of economic resurgence that might never come.

And "Houses and Billboards in Atlanta" takes a comical turn on Hollywood, showing run-down homes fenced in by movie billboard showing glamour stars of 1936.



Evans began his journey into documentary photography in the mid-1930s when he traveled to Paris. Immersing himself in that city's vibrant art scene, he began working with a camera in 1928. His influences were Mathew Brady (the famous Civil War cameraman) and the Cubism and post-Impressionism artists of France. His advice to photographers: "Stare. It's the way to educate your eye. Stare, pry, listen, eavesdrop."

An exhibit of Walker Evans photographs is now being shown at the Cantor Arts Center at Stanford University. Admission is free. The museum is open 11:00AM -5:00PM, Wednesday through Sunday and until 8:00PM on Thursday.

In general Betty will speak to impact, composition & technical proficiency of each image. The critique is designed to be a learning experience with emphasis on how images might be improved.


