"Environmental Photography"

After working 20 years in the high technology industry, **Ralph Schardt**, our guest speaker at the November meeting, went back to school to earn a degree in Environmental Studies. He has taught practically all grade levels including college, and leads nature and birding tours for local groups. He is an avid birder and was involved in a two year project photographing the reintroduction of the California Condor at Pinnacles N.M. for the National Parks Service. His photos from this work were widely published. He has taught outdoor photography classes for Recreational Equipment Incorporated (REI), Orvis, San Jose State University, USNPS, as well as by private invitation. He is passionate about pro-



tecting nature and uses his photographic skills to document and promote environmental causes.

His presentation on the condor reintroduction was both enlightening and informative. When he heard about the reintroduction program, he offered his services to the National Park Service. They accepted and he became an integral member of the team of volunteers and park service employees dedicated to the recovery of this magnificent bird.



The California Condor is the largest flying land bird in North America and a California signature species. Condors were killed en masse during the Gold Rush for their quills, which were used to carry gold dust. The population further declined from lead poisoning and habitat loss over the next hundred years.

In the mid-1980s, the last 22 wild condors were captured for a captive breeding program to save the species from extinction. The condors adapted well to captive breeding, and about 300 birds currently live in the wild in areas such as Big Sur, Pinnacles National Monument and the Ventana Wilderness area.



The project required a sizable commitment of time and energy. First an aviary had to be built atop the mountain. Since there were no roads, lumber and building materials were airlifted via helicopter to a staging area and then carried by workers to the summit aviary site. Eventually trails were carved out to facilitate the difficult trek up. Usually on site from 6:00AM to 1:00PM each day, Ralph alternated between taking photographs and working alongside the others.

Ralph's presentation to the club

was different in that the emphasis was not on techniques for becoming a better photographer, but rather on a way to use the skills we already have to further a cause. Photography is a powerful tool that can be used to educate and promote conservation. It can be used in campaigns to attract funding and grants, and you don't have to be a professional photographer to get involved. Ralph volunteered his services and then hoped he could, "rise to the challenge."

By sharing the Condor Recovery Program, Ralph showed us

how we as photographers can contribute to the causes we deem important; whether they are environmental, scientific, religious, cultural, or educational. What is your cause and how can you use your photography to promote it?
