Print Critique by Hal Geren

Twice a year we invite a guest commentator to review prints submitted by members. Hal is an experienced photographer, trained judge, and president of the Fremont Camera Club. Hal commented on initial impact, composition, technical proficiency, and photographic interest on a total of thirty-three prints. When appropriate, he also made suggestions on how a photograph might be improved.



- Be aware of depth of field. A blurred background can make the main subject pop.
- A foreground element will add interest and a sense of depth, but don't let it block the viewer's eye from entering the photo.
- Eyes must be sharp.
- Avoid overlapping elements. Each object should have its own space.
- Leave space so paws, fingers, toes and heads do not touch the edge of the photo.
- The viewer's eye will go to bright areas first. A darker background with a lighter subject is better than a dark subject with a light background. Eliminate bright spots that distract from the main subject.
- Darken the edges to keep the viewer's eye in the photo, but make it look natural.
- Crop out dead areas that do not enhance the main subject.
- Crop strongly or not at all. Better to crop half of a person than just his feet.
- Use natural elements (like rocks or trees) to frame the main subject.
- Know the Rule of Thirds and then break it when centering works better.
- Use leading lines to guide the viewer's eye into the photo and to the main subject.
- Be careful of distractions at the edge of the frame: bright spots, twigs, unattached leaves, etc.
- Diagonal lines and angles add interest and drama.
- Good landscapes usually have a foreground (sand), middle ground (waves), and background (stormy sky).
- Unless you're going for a silhouette, shadowed areas need some detail.
- Be careful of an unwanted color cast (a tint that effects the whole photo).

The Shot by Mark Grzan

It was late afternoon on Friday, October 25, 2013. I found myself with time and decided to go on a backyard photo shoot. I consider Morgan Hill to be the finest backyard anyone could have. Both sides of our valley are available for incredible morning and afternoon photography. No season of the year is any better than any other and I can venture along trails and roads any time of year.

One of my favorite places for local outdoor photography is Harvey Bear Ranch County Park on the eastern foothills. It is accessible at several points, but easiest is at the valley floor at the eastern end of San Martin Avenue in San Martin. It is open from 8AM to sunset. There is plenty of free parking. Adjacent to the parking lot is a wonderful paved and level loop that is over a mile long that walkers, strollers and bicyclists use often.

Heading east from the parking lot, the park has many trail options. You can walk in any direction and find great photography. You can stay on the well maintained trails or scamper off along the hillside or ridge lines. You may also share the trail with cows, horses, or an occasional coyote. On this afternoon I headed east from the parking lot and turned southeast on the Willow Springs Trail, and then north on the Townsprings Trail. There are stately oaks on either side. My light was from the west and primarily at my back. Getting good outdoor images is often about “side light” that defines and outlines shapes with a gradient wrap from light to dark. Light directly at your back creates a flat image, while side light of just about any angle gives you good contrast and tones.

On this late afternoon in the golden hour, I spotted a strong oak with light filtering through its massive, rustic boughs. The composition was good with trees in the distant background and a drifting road which added balance. For a different perspective, I moved close to the tree and used the trunk to anchor the frame.

I set the shutter speed to 1/250 second to reduce camera shake, and aperture to f11, for good medium depth of field. Any higher would have forced me to a higher ISO which could in-

troduce noise on some cameras. I locked exposure for the shadows. The wide angle lens pleasingly distorted the image. Hand-held, I framed to 15mm, focused and took the shot. Checking my camera’s histogram (a must), the range of light was even and with no clipping (loss of detail). I took a few more shots from other angles as well. The final image is a non-traditional view with rich warm tones and a pleasing stratus sky. In order to get the lovely rustic bark, the focus of the image, I had to move in close. The result is a heavy crop of the tree, but it works. If you have to crop, crop strongly, so it is clearly intentional as opposed to looking like a mistake.

I processed the raw image in Adobe Camera Raw. I added vibrancy, adjusted temperature (a little warmer), added sharpening, adjusted for noise, added a little vignetting, and reduced some shadows. Slight cropping enhanced the composition. I used Nik’s Viveza 2.0 add-on for more structure that caught additional light and brought out a tad more detail. The final image measures 18.5 x 13, is 375 MB @ 300 dpi, has a bit depth 16, and is saved as a Photoshop PSD file/image.

A message from the president

Fellow Photographers,

For some time I have been contemplating giving an **Adobe Lightroom 5 Course** at the Morgan Hill Community and Cultural Center. Well the time has come. **Starting on Tuesday, January 21, from 7-9PM and lasting for ten (10) weeks** I will be covering all the modules in Lightroom 5 with special emphasis on the “Library” and “Develop” modules, which are the heart of Lightroom. In addition you’ll learn how to make a book using the “Book” module and how to use the “Print” module to its best advantage even if you do not do your own printing.

We will also explore how to use plug-ins, external editing programs, and other add-ons that allow you to process more complex images such as panoramas, HDR, and time-lapse videos. I’ll also explain how to correctly capture such images so when you process them in Lightroom so you’ll get the best results. Although you can’t process videos directly in Lightroom, I’ll show you a trick that will let you make several adjustments that will improve the video you captured without having to use an external program like Adobe Premiere. Then we’ll combine the videos and your still images into a slideshow that can be turned into a high-definition video suitable for YouTube or Vimeo.

What you’ll need: A laptop computer with Lightroom 5 installed, an external usb hard drive to store your catalog and images, and a willingness to learn. Although there is no textbook I will suggest that you purchase at least one of the books that I’ll recommend, to be used as a reference guide. No prior Lightroom experience is required, but you should be familiar with how the file system works on your computer.

The cost of this course is just \$189. If you are a member of a photography or camera club within a fifty (50) mile radius or a college student enrolled in a photography program you will receive a \$30 discount. [Payment through PayPal can be arranged.]

The course will be limited to twenty-two (22) students.
The minimum class size is fifteen (15).
