January Meeting

“Using the Internet to Show, Share & Sell Your Photographs”

Four club members formed a panel to share their knowledge and experience in using the internet.

Social Media sites are virtual, online locations where friends and followers can connect and share. **Nichole Larsen** started the program by describing several such sites that are geared toward photographers,

including **Facebook, Pinerest** and **Instagram**. On each site, you create a free account and then gather friends and followers who can see and read what you post. Nichole emphasized that you should read the “Terms & Conditions” carefully before signing up and posting photos. Some sites require that you give them full access to your photos which they may then use and alter without your specific permission. Although you can set a privacy level that is comfortable for you, any photo that is posted on the internet is vulnerable to being seen and used by others.



A blog (web+log = blog) is an online journal that can be shared with the public and/or just friends and family. **Tracey Morris** is the club’s Blog Queen. She started several years ago with the objective of taking a photograph every day for a year and posting them on a blog. Even though she had no idea just how hard that would be, she accomplished her goal. She started with **Blogger**, but has since moved on to a customized site that features her thoughtful writing as well as her photographs.

Tracey said that one way to build a following for your blog is to search for other bloggers who have similar interests and leave comments on their posts. You can also expand your number of followers by joining several social media sites and connecting them by posting on one, (say Facebook) with a link to another (like your blog).

Sell Your Photographs on the internet like professional photographer **Noella Vigeant**. Noella stressed that the first order of business is to determine who your potential customers are. Artistic or fine art photography has a different customer base than event or commercial photography. The next step is to choose an online company that will best connect your photography with your customers.



- **Stock photography:** Images are filed with an agency that negotiates licensing fees on the photographer’s behalf in exchange for a percentage of the sale price. One photo may be sold numerous times. Examples include **iStockPhoto, Fotolia** and **Shutterstock**.
- **Craft Photography:** Photographs can be used to create unique products, such as note cards, mugs, jewelry, posters, customized clothing, invitations, and even postage stamps. Three examples are **Etsy, Zazzle** and **CafePress**.
- **Online Portfolios:** Using an online site to host a portfolio allows you to not only showcase your photographs, you have access to printing and fulfillment services. You upload your photos, send out a link, and your customers order and pay for the products through the website. Many of these sites offer an array of products that can be customized with your photographs, as well as framed prints. **Smugmug, Zenfolio, Shutterbug Storefront, Fine Art America, and Red Bubble** are a few of the many sites willing to sell your photographs for a percentage.

Personal Websites can be used for showcasing and selling a portfolio of photographs, expressing personal thoughts, teaching, and promoting yourself as a photographer. **George Ziegler**, who is the club’s webmaster, summarized the types of personal websites that are available, depending on your expertise in programming and the amount of time you want to spend on design and upkeep.



Some “drag & drop” sites, such as **Smugmug** and **Weebly** require no programming knowledge. With others you can “roll your own” by acquiring a domain name through **GoDaddy**, do your own design and programming with **Dream Weaver** or **Muse**, and create themes with **Wordpress**. After acquiring a unique domain name and buying a hosting service, you can create email accounts.

A lot of overlapping occurs in the content and purpose of social media sites, blogs, commercial sites and websites. How do you know which one is right for you? The answer lies in determining your individual purpose for using the internet, and how much time and money you want to spend. Social media and blog sites are mostly free. Commercial sites will do a lot of the work of selling for you, but they take a percentage of your profits. With a website you have the cost of buying a domain name and hosting service, and you may need to hire someone to design your site. If you really want to promote yourself and you enjoy your time at the computer, employ them all. Join Facebook, post photos on Flickr, create bulletin boards on Pinterest, share your innermost thoughts on Blogger, and link them to your personal website.

What's almost as much fun as taking photographs? Sharing them!. **Flickr** is a photo sharing website that has become an integral feature of the club. With two main Flickr sites (**Monthly Theme Projects** and **Shoot-Outs**), plus the three Focus Group sites (**Macro, P&S, and Night Photography**), if you're not on Flickr you are missing out on some serious club fun, and you're missing an opportunity to learn by viewing the photos that others take, and allowing others to view and comment on your photos.



Anyone may view the club photos on Flickr, but to post your own photos, you must first get a Yahoo ID and then open a Flickr account.

How to Open a Free Flickr Account

1 Go to the club's website (<http://www.morganhillphotographyclub.org>) and click on "Joining Yahoo & Flickr" (under *Useful Information*)
Download the PDF document and follow the step-by-step instructions.

2 In the hour prior to the March meeting, you may make an appointment to work on-on-one with a Flickr guru who will guide you through the process of setting up an account and teach you how to upload your photos and post them to the club sites.

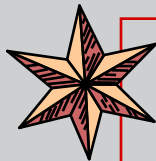
