Second Critique Assignment

Every two months, members are challenged with a photographic assignment. Those who choose to accept the assignment may post up to three of their photos to a designated Flickr site under the following conditions:

- The photos must be taken during the assignment period. (approximately 8 weeks)
- Each person posting a photo is expected to give and receive constructive feedback.

**For every photo you post,
you must give feedback to at least one other posted photo.**

The purpose of the critique assignments is to help members improve their photography by taking new photos; trying new techniques; exploring different subjects; and giving and receiving effective feedback.

“Backlight”

Any subject is acceptable as long as the light is coming from behind said subject. Natural light and/or studio light may be used. People, landscapes, and animals make good backlit subjects, But don't limit yourself to what you've seen others do. Make your own magic. How to Critique a Photograph

NOTE: Do not point out flaws in someone's work without the expressed permission of the photographer. This article is written as general information and expressly for the photos that are part of the Critique Assignments (see page 3). Comments on Shoot-out photos and Monthly Theme photos should all be positive.

Many people think that to “critique” means to point out what is wrong with a photo. That would be plain “criticism.” Critiquing means to analyze and evaluate a work by pointing out both its merits and flaws. Although a critique is an opinion, it is somewhat objective in that it is based on a core of common standards.

You don't need to be an expert to evaluate another person's photograph. Even if you feel you don't have a strong technical background, you can comment on how and why the photograph affects you, or how well it tells a story.

The key is to provide specific feedback. Compliments are always nice to receive, but they do little more than boost the ego. If you like a photo, comment on exactly why it pleases you. If you perceive a flaw in a photograph, point it out and suggest how it might be improved. Specific feedback helps the photographer become a better photographer.

Here is an outline that will help you focus a critical eye on a photograph (your own or another's). You don't have to use the entire outline on one photo. Choose the items that are most pertinent.

1. Technical Quality

- A. Exposure: Are any areas over or under exposed? How might the photographer prevent or fix this in the future?
- B. Focus: Is the main subject in sharp focus? If not, does this detract from the photo?
- C. Depth of Field: Note whether the DOF is shallow or deep. Does it work for this shot?
- D. Color: Is the white balance set correctly, or is there an odd color cast to the photo? Are the colors over (or under) saturated? If it's a B&W photo, is there true black and true white, with a full tonal range in between, or is the photo mostly gray?

2. Composition

- A. Where is the main subject in the frame? Would it be stronger in a different spot?
- B. Is there a foreground object to add interest and a sense of depth (landscapes)?
- C. Is the horizon straight?
- D. Is there clutter in the frame, especially around the border, that detracts from the main subject? Could it be removed by shooting from a different perspective, or by cloning?
- E. Are there bright areas that pull the eye away from the subject or out of the frame?
- F. Does each significant object in the frame have its own space or do they overlap?
- G. Is every object in the frame complete, or are any partially cut off?
- H. Did the photographer add visual interest with diagonal lines, implied shapes, or curves? Are there leading lines that pull the viewer into the photograph?
- I. Is the composition balanced (light vs. dark, big vs. little, foreground vs. middle & back grounds, etc.)?

3. Emotional Appeal

- A. How does the photograph make you feel?
- B. Does the photograph tell an effective story? If not, why not?
- C. Do you feel like the photographer communicated his/her intended message? How?

Critiquing provides benefit for both the reviewer and the photographer. As you learn to give effective feedback to others' photographs, you will naturally start to analyze your own photographs with the same analytical eye. Remember that a critique is no more a learning tool. As a photographer you can evaluate the feedback and accept it or reject it. You'll get as much out of the process as you allow.

Focus Groups Review

Focus Groups have become an integral feature of the club. They allow members to delve more deeply into a specific aspect of photography and to work in a small group with other members who have the same interest. Once established, Focus Groups are self directing, with the members deciding where and when to meet and how they want to pursue their interest. Each group has a facilitator who is the contact person for the group and who coordinates the meetings and activities. 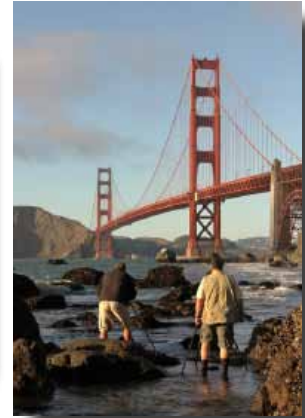
Golden Gate from Baker/Marshall Beach Wednesday 8 October
