P elcome to the rebirth of our club's monthly newsletter. In the past Susan Brazelton was our fearless editor and Jeff DuBridge has graciously volunteered to fill her shoes.

March was our 5th Annual Open Projector Night with six members presenting. What a packed night it was! If you were there I hope you left inspired and ready to shoot. If you missed this event, well, all I can say is "Don't miss the next one."

To recap briefly, our first presenter, and perhaps our youngest member, was Curtis Bireley. Curtis shared a stunning photo of a green bridge taken in Oregon. His intent was to produce a center weighted image with leading lines. A buddy of his climbed out onto those tresses and sat down, 150 feet above ground! The resulting image was breathtaking.

Next, upon further examination, Dong Bui's photo of a pond in Vietnam, revealed buffalo traveling in a line through the mist far back in the photo—not his intended subject. He had to borrow a tripod from his tour guide because his wife was using the only one they brought. His travel tip: bring two cameras and your own tripod.

Editor Notes

R eligion is a hard word for me to say. I was brought up as a Catholic and went through the entire processes of learning, prayer, and priests. As I aged into my teenage years, I truly tried praying, asking for this and that, and how to provide for others. Heard not a thing, either directly or indirectly from Them. I gave up, but not totally.



Directly after high school I spent a year as a professional bike racer. Sounds good, but in truth I was nothing but a lowly domestique. My knees gave way, moved back in with my parents, and I was forced to begin college—either that or pay rent. On a whim, I took a beginning drawing class and learned of Degas, Kandinsky, and, most notably, Man Ray. He was both into the usual arts of draw and paint, but also set the stage in photography as an art. I distinctly recall reviewing his exquisite modern art photographs all shot without cameras! I was hooked, yet religion stayed deep within, searching, wishing for reason.

Again, on a whim, I will be taking an *Introduction to Buddhism* course starting next week. Reading ahead, I discovered instruction from Buddhist fine art photographers, such as Zen master John Daido Loori, teaching his students through koan (a question beyond rational intellect) with, "Photograph a feeling of love you have for some person, place, or thing, other than yourself, and use light in such a way that light reveals the loveliness of your subject." The goal is to photograph something evoking feeling, whatever or wherever it might happen to truly be. Only when a photographer feels the presence of the subject does a resonance occur between it and the photographer. A certain relationship is discovered between object and light and eye, as fingers feel how the moment might wish to be framed. It's only once the mind has stopped moving that the picture can take itself, the camera photograph by itself, just as the Zen artist's brush can draw and write by itself. John Daido Loori calls his art "making love with light." It is with influences of Buddhism, that there may be an opening up of the boundary between life and art.

Now, is Buddhism a religion? I shall wait and see.

How The Club Got Started

some well-known local photographers, and arranged for the first meeting to be held at BookSmart. She hoped maybe five people would show up.

Twenty-one people attended that first meeting in April 2008. Susan then secured the multi–purpose room at the Centennial Recreational Center, and the meetings have been held there ever since. Thirty-four people came to the second meeting, an executive board was established, and the club was off and running. The people who attended the first meeting agreed with Susan that the club focus should be learning more about photography, sharing photos, and creating friendships.

Within the first few months the board initiated the monthly Flickr Theme Projects, published the newsletter, established a checking account, promoted the club at a downtown street fair, held the first gallery show, and created the Yahoo Discussion Forum. 2008 ended with eighty-five members. And then you could say, "The rest is history!"

Over the past nine years the club:

- Selected the club logo (members voted on several contest entries)
- Created a website (first by Roy Hovey and then by George Ziegler)
- Increased the number of gallery shows to four
- Founded the innovative round-robin image share that starts each meeting
- Presented over 80 monthly learning programs

- Added two rotating Member-At-Large positions to the board
- Established Focus Groups
- Established a Shoot-out Committee and a Gallery Show Committee
- Initiated connections with community organizations, leaders & citizens
- Changed presidents in 2013
- Held over 200 shoot-outs
- Posted over 13,000 photos on Flickr
- Increased the club membership to187 (at the end of 2016)

Why has the club been so successful? Low dues and the advent of digital photography are major contributing factors. But the core of the success came from the vision of the charter members to emphasize learning and friendship over competition. The willingness of members to share their expertise has been significant. The various people who have served on the board each added his/her unique perspective in guiding the club. Always the board members have taken the position, "Let's try it." The people who became Focus Group Facilitators and those who have generously worked on the various committees deserve much of the credit.

The success of any organization always comes back to the people who are in it. Every person who has ever joined the club has contributed a distinct energy that combined with others' to create a thriving, ever-evolving organization of which we can all be proud.

The Master Photographers

Interview with Lance C. Trott by Jeff DuBridge prior to the March, 2017 club meeting

JD: What brought you to photography?

LT: I've been into photography since I've been 18 years old. I bought a camera, a Yashica, 35mm. I took it apart and then had to go buy another one, I couldn't figure on how to put it back together. (Laughter) So that's two Yashicas, one for parts and one that was working.

JD: What was next—how did that evolved?

LT: It was just snapshots, whenever I saw a picture I thought I'd like, I'd take it—it wasn't really much to speak of. I didn't really get into photography until the early '80's.

I started to buy equipment for a tax shelter, and I bought expensive equipment, Hasselblads, and I tried wedding photography, and I tried portrait photography, but my desires were for doing landscape and trying to sell my own pictures. So I gave up wedding photography and I gave up portrait photography and did landscapes and sold nothing.

I had a full-time job, just to support my photography, and trying to work the other 40 in photography. It was getting to be too much. I was working 80 hour weeks. So, I just gave up in photography. I just sold everything and hadn't even a camera.

JD: What brought you back?

LT: The photography desire! I started out with a little...what was it...Vivitar point and shoot, film, 35mm, and graduated to Nikon. Progressively a Nikon D70, D80, D300, D700, D800, and then D810. I started back in 2000...2001, and it stuck. It's still here. Now, I'm into video and aerial photography.

JD: Details.

LT: Drone, camera with propellers, Sony 4K video, drone 4K video. Put them up on YouTube and put them up on Flickr and let people look at them.

JD: So you love photography?

LT: Yes.

JD: What else?

LT: That's it.

JD: What else do you do in your day?

LT: Photography!

JD: So there's going to the bathroom, eating...

LT: Going to the bathroom, eat, and sleep and maybe watch some TV. That's it!

JD: So what would your normal day be like?

LT: Well about four hours working on videos today and the rest was...well, I went out and took a walk this morning and that's about what my life is. I've been retired twenty-two years now and I haven't had a bored minute since.

JD: Good! Are you glad you got rid of the ol' stereotypic job?

LT: Oh, definitely! (Laughter) I was ready to do just about anything to get rid of working for a living.

JD: Okay, so money's not a issue here, you could get whatever you want; film, lighting, software?

LT: (Laughter) I've got it! Oh, if I had my druthers, I'd have myself a Hasselbald, and I'd have an assistant to carry everything around, if money was no object.

JD: Anything else?

LT: Bigger drone. (Laughter)

George Ziegler interrupts: He wants an Apache, an Apache helicopter.

LT: Yeah, right, yeah. The Apache or the Comanche. (Laughter) I like those guns on them, good for hunting.

JD: It's tweny years ago when film was fully the main component and the cameras changed little.

LT: I had my own darkroom back then and I studied a lot of Ansel Adams' Zone Photography and that's what helped me tremendously with present day—understanding light and pre-visualization.

JD: During the snapshot years, what was your focus, your funs, your other desires?

LT: The Navy. The Navy had me for four years.

JD: What was after the navy?

LT: Nothing much but drink beer and have fun. (Laughter)

JD: What's your favorite beer?

LT: Well, now it's Guiness.

JD: Oh, my favorite too, or darker, that's the way to go!

When you're taking a photograph, it can go from the very beginning, ideas of what and how to photograph, general thoughts on leading yourself through the process, going all the way through to printing. What's your most important part?

LT: Your most important part is your pre-visualization. Okay, where you know every step that you've got to take to that final print. But knowing and how to work every single step all the way through to the final print. That's the big thing, that's one of the things I learned with studying Ansel Adam's, the pre-visualization. Before the picture. Before you snap the shutter; achievment intentions, exposures, software, all the way to what paper your going to use in the final print.

JD: Isn't it being able to take the photograph and alter it in the software more important than the pre-visualization before you take the shot?

LT: Just as important. To me your computer is 50% of your photography nowadays, where in the past your darkroom was probably 60 to 70% of photography.

JD: Now it's a broken 50/50.

LT: Yeah, I'd say about 50/50, because the camera's are so technical and advanced now with what you can do with them.

JD: Do you shoot RAW or jpeg?

LT: RAW. Never jpeg.

The event may be cancelled in the event of rain.

Each MHPC member may submit up to three (3) works for review by the selection committee. If submitting more than one image, the probability of selection will be increased if the images are of different subjects. The photographs must be the original work of the photographer, have been captured by a digital or film photographic process, be framed or mounted (mandatory), and have not been in a previous MHPC exhibition. The minimum size of accepted photographs is 8"x10" (exclusive of the mat and/or frame).

April 20th, Thursday: Stanford University Shootout

Photo locations are Hoover Tower Observation deck, Memorial Church interior, Cantor Arts Center, outdoor Rodin sculpture garden, and the QUAD.

You will have flexibility in selecting time you can allocate to each location. Some constraints:

- Hoover Tower is open 10am to 4pm. Entry is fee \$4 [seniors \$3]. Last ticket sold at 3:30pm.
- Memorial Church is open 8am to 5pm
- Cantor Arts Center is open 11am to 8pm

The above locations do not allow the use of tripods, selfie sticks, or large bags. Outdoor shooting, with a tripod, can be done at any time—suggest we do that from 3–5pm. Using your tripod after shooting the three locations may seem reasonable, say after 5pm. Sunset is approximately 7:45pm.

Paid public parking [6am–4pm] is available at many sites. It is free after 4pm. Permit parking lots [marked A & C] are open to public after 4pm. However permit parking lots [A & C] near the oval are open to public only after 6pm.

The Judging:

• Each ticket holder of the Wine Stroll will be given a ballot so that they can participate in the judging on the day of the Wine Stroll event.

Award:

- The winning artist will receive a one-year membership to the Morgan Hill Downtown Association which will include a feature story about the competition highlighting the winning artist.
- The winning artist will also receive their choice of the following:
 - Case of assorted wine from the Wine Stroll participants (must be over 21).
 - Gift certificate valued at \$100 from a local hobby/art supply shop.
