## **Editor's Note**

s your photography art? My answer has always been, yes. However, with some recent delves into this realm, I am not so self assured.

Before I yearn for an answer to the question, let us define art in the visual realm. According to the Merriam-Webster English Dictionary, the definition of art is:

1: a: branch of learning: (1): one of the humanities (2): arts plural: liberal arts

2: an occupation requiring knowledge or skill the art of *organ* building

3: a: the conscious use of skill and creative imagination especially in the production of aesthetic objects the art of painting landscapes; also: works so produced a gallery for modern art

b: (1): fine arts (2): one of the fine arts (3): one of the graphic arts

For the moment, we will label artists as the group in the painting, drawing, sculpture realm, while photographers, who may be artists, shall be defined as those creating photos.

Many artists irrationally label photography as not art, often with little premise. From the website debate.com (providing the online question: is photography art?), one artists states, "simply put: a 4 year old can take, on accident, or on purpose, on first attempt, the exact same photograph as Peter Lik, Stephen McCurry, or Robert Mapplethorpe. Or anyone could, for that matter. A 4year old cannot, however, sit down and play Moonlight Sonata on first attempt. That would require, skill, interpretation, and practice."

Photographers, just as artists, label art with little premise, or do they? A photographer, again from debate.com, says, "For those who say that photography can't be art because anyone can do it. I will give you the chance to prove it: Pick an iconic photograph like Ansel Adams's The Tetons and the Snake River, the location is still there, go to the location and take a photograph equal to Adams's. Don't fancy traveling? Take any portrait by Yousuf Karsh and recreate it. Then come back here and show us how easy is to create those images."

Now, the money. Many artists state that the only reason a professional photographer takes pictures is for the simple intent of generating cash. Let's say that might be true. If photos are produced for the money, why does almost every professional artist, generate the almost the same pieces over and over and over again? It is simple, because they know that delving into other areas of interest would provide almost nothing in the way of money, and will most likely degrade their name upon review of this new art by the critics.

Next comes the question of the classification of the photographers' or artists' work. Is all work made by either end considered a final, quality piece? Photographers take pictures just on a whim (snapshots), being curious what might be generated with minimal pre-visualization. Artists do the same, often in a sketchbook (doodling), with quick gesture drawings without analyzing every motion to be made. Pieces made in either area may be beauties, but more often, not art.

Our definition makes a reference to modern art, yet almost no one online or my discussion with friends and family, provides little reference here. Without being said, all art discussed seems to be a nice representation piece of the landscape, face, house, flowers, or action. In modern art, photographer Man Ray, developed pictures with out a camera, simply placing items on a negative and exposing it to light.



Art? Modern artist Ad Reinhardt had a gallery full of canvases, covered in black paint. Art?

Man Ray and Reinhardt, art? Yes, without doubt. Now, do you wish to spend a few thousand for either piece when these pieces first came out? Probably not. The point here is that it took many years of education and experience to arrive at such art. Most people with practice by a spontaneous swipe of the pencil or countless whacks to the iPhone could not generate such art upon their first attempts.

For the final time, we fall back to our definition. Art requires knowledge or skill, as does photography or desired use of the brush. Next, art requires conscious skill and creative imagination in the production of a person's conception of beauty, in particular ones taste for or approach to what is pleasing to the senses with greatest focus to sight. Most all photography and art, regardless of the time it takes make, has such intent (in truth some artwork, intentionally, does supply hate and disgust). Finally, is the production of works for a gallery of modern art. Galleries carry the classics, moderns, contemporaries, which are all labeled as fine arts—whether you like the piece(s) or not. Specifically, galleries will present common pieces as paintings, drawings, prints, photographs, sculptures, installation pieces, or any mix of such categories and not uncommonly presented with real (or recorded) people, music, or movements, and I can go on.

Is your photography art? Many people, often including amateur photographers, blindly label art as a sort of bizarre, disparate set of pieces that take time to appreciate. Here is a listing of fine artists, creating photographs (and possibly other forms of art), from many categories, and at least one shall provide you with a conception of beauty, in particular ones taste for or approach to what is pleasing to the senses with greatest focus to sight: Annie Leibovitz, Cindy Sherman, Steve McCurry, Ansel Adams, Joe McNally, Edward Weston, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Irving Penn, W. Eugene Smith, Walker Evans. Arnold Newman, Robert Capa, Robert Mapplethorpe, Vivian Maier, Dorothea Lange, Yousuf Karsh, Alfred Stieglitz, Brassai, Man Ray, Sebastião Salgado, Richard Avedon, Elliot Erwitt, Diane Arbus, Sally Mann, Jerry Uelsmann...

Think about what are some of the greatest photographs of all time, and many of the above artists would have pressed the shutter. Photography is art.

The 10 lines are Vertical line, Horizontal, Diagonal, Zig Zag/ Broken, S-Curve, C-Curve, Spiral, Implied, Leading, & Vanishing.

Just as twilight was upon us and the ducks were all headed into the tall grass to sleep, we dashed out of the building and converged onto the landscape of the CRC center. Clutching our little slips of paper listing the 11 types of lines we were to shoot, our cameras clicked away as darkness inched across the sky.

We all then returned to our tables to share our images then packed up and headed home. A good time was had by all. Until next month, keep your batteries charged, your lens caps handy (Rick), and look for those lines.


## Photographers on Screen
