
September's featured photographer is Shea Collinge. Come early, or stay late & see her images, talk to her about her work, and enjoy her creativity.

I recently read another news article concerning the death, "Police have arrested two suspects in the murder and prosecutors say they have video evidence of the crime." Good news? Sort of.

Lynda.com, is an excellent website to join, with tons of video course on photographic topics, including Lightroom and Photoshop, but it costs \$19.99 per month. Ouch. Gordon Thenemann, also on Yahoo Groups, informed us if you have a Santa Clara County Library card, you can access the Lynda.com website through the SCCL system. This link will take you to the Lynda.com login page. At this point you will be asked to provide your library card number and the PIN number that you created for your card.

This one's good. It was a few years ago a Dallas couple complained all over the place about their wedding photographer's "hidden charge of \$125." Their complaint goes viral on social media, and the couple goes on local news (tv & newspaper) to complain that the photographer was holding their wedding photos hostage.

According to the photographer, all the couple had to do was choose a cover for their wedding album, fill out a form and pay a \$125 fee. The couple had agreed to that charge, in writing, beforehand.

After months of trying to work things out with the couple, including offering to absorb the fee, the couple refused, and due to all the negative press, the photographer's career ended, and decided to sue in March 2015.

And, get this, the photographer won and was awarded \$1.08 million!

August Meeting Review

he August meeting was, if you missed it, an excellent meeting in that it provided us with details of the Morgan Hill Photography Club's Focus Groups. While we all know that the Focus Groups exist, as they have for many years now, unless you've had a chance to go to one of their meetings, the question arises; what do they actually do? An easy question. Here goes.



The best group presentation was, by far, from George Ziegler on the details of his long running Lightroom Focus Group. George is, without doubt, an expert in Lightroom and, in addition, Photoshop. He describes that the fundamentals of Lightroom can be learned in a fairly straightforward fashion but it is in the intricacies of the program where the true power, effectiveness, and speed of the

program can be harnessed. Much of his guidance is not written in text, or recorded in video, but has been mastered through years of use. While Lightroom is an excellent program, here's the fact: it doesn't do everything. At times, Photoshop can be used in areas that Lightroom does not cover (no one program ever has it all) and the group learns how to use Photoshop for those periodic changes to photos, which can be, with George's help, easily understood. Here's the best part, only the tap of a few keys brings the photo automatically over to Photoshop and, the same keys bring the photo back to Lightroom, just as if the two programs were one. George's Lightroom Focus Group meetings focus on either a planned presentation, or, just ask, and the meeting can address any questions you might have. Don't miss it. The Lightroom Group meets the the third Thursday of every month. Contact George for time & place.

The Night Focus Group has been restarted by Noël Calvi and Rick Rasmussen. While Noël and Rick are definitely in the dark, that's exactly where they want you to be. Night Photography can be loads of fun but requires some techniques which can be learned through days or weeks of trial and error, or by a simple travel to a Night Focus Group meeting. Enough for now as, being the Focus Group of the Month, Noël will further explain the benefits of this focus group in another article.

People Focus Group is easy to understand as it focuses on... people. Larry Campbell described how the group specifically spends time on taking pictures of people from a full body pose, all the way into tight headshots. Photos are taken both inside and out via a variety of tools and techniques. As an example, Larry described how the tools used inside a building can range from expensive, many thousands, strobe lighting all the way down to the ordinary light bulb. If you don't have either, that's all the better because Larry explains how no *one* People Focus Group member knows it all (not one photographer, anywhere, ever knows it all), and how each member loves to explain not only how their lighting works, but to also allow any member to use their lighting equipment so they can understand how lighting—sometimes just off camera flash—can be utilized in portrait photography. Interested? All you need to bring is

your camera. The group meets every 4–6 weeks. Meeting are held either local or on trips to other locations. Contact Larry Campbell for meeting details.

Macro Focus Group has also had a restart via the guidance of Ron Cabral. Macro photography, a focus on photographing small objects, is very popular. These objects can be anything you'd like such as flowers, tools, toys, insects (be careful with the spiders though...of course, spiders aren't even insects), eyes, parts of a house, car, plant, or tree, or even, just plain old trash. The group is similar to



other Focus Groups by supplying both study, practice, trips, or anything macro. While special macro lenses are made, normal zoom lenses will usually have a macro setting, so, as with the other groups, just show up and have some fun.

Next is the ever expanding Video & Drone Focus Group. David Fredericks leads the group and the group has recently spent much time shooting videos via their drones. With a drone, one can probe almost anywhere, assuming it is legal (read George Ziegler's article on the legality of drones in last month's *InFocus*), from both high and low. The group meets the third Tuesday of every month, contact David for times and places.

Ram Gupta manages the Compact Camera Focus Group. For many, the compact camera (either a small hand-held all the way to the smart phone), provides photographing various environments in a simple, go anywhere manner. The group meets periodically and discusses the tools, techniques, practice, and most anything in the realm of the compact camera. Contact Ram for meeting times and places.

Lastly there is the Printing Focus Group. In truth this group doesn't really exist anymore but <u>Jack Yovanov</u> lead the group for years and has a variety of documents to aid in improving your printing. If your truly interested in learning more than is supplied in Jack's documents, he can provide tips on where to look for acquiring knowledge in the specific areas your inter-

ested in. Also, if a large enough group is interested in learning more about printing photographs, contact Jack & he may provide guidance in starting the group once again. [ed., this was not verified with Jack but it never hurts to ask]

This Month's Featured Focus Group: Night Photography

ight photography is, like most photography, about light and controlling it thru the exposure triangle (aperture, shutter speed, ISO). You can render the night as cobalt blue during the magic hour (30 minutes after sunset), as the pitch black of midnight, or as if it were day.

What you need:

- Camera (with manual & independent control of focus, aperture, shutter speed, ISO)
- Steady place to mount your camera (table, tripod, car roof)
- Shutter trigger (self timer, remote control, cable, smart phone app)
- Flashlight
- Red headlamp
- Patience

Challenges:

 It's hard to focus at night. If you can, arrive early to scope out the scene and determine your compo-

- sition. Focus your lens when it's still light, turn off the autofocus and use gaffer tape (available at meetings) to secure the focus ring in place.
- You typically can't rely on your meter so take a shot and make micro adjustments until the images looks right.
- More noise is introduced as your exposure time increases. Learn the max ISO for where you consider noise to be acceptable. Play with noise reduction options (in camera—which doubles your exposure time; out of camera—which softens the image) to decide what makes sense for the current shot.
- When you shoot in a group using headlamps, inevitably you get the red cast from everyone's lamps. To avoid this, spread out, turn off your lights or, as a last resort, fix post processing.

Call for Entries: The Morgan Hill Photography Club and the City of Morgan Hill are pleased to announce an open call for entries for an upcoming gallery show to be held at the Centennial Recreation Senior Center October 2 through November

10, 2017. Only members of the MHPC are eligible to enter.

The theme of the exhibition is titled: What Is It? The objective is to capture a picture of a subject in such a way that the viewer has to question or is unsure what it is. Every photo will be titled What Is It? and viewers will need to refer to the Exhibit Guide to confirm what it actually is. Your photographs may be reproduced in black & white, or color. All photos must represent the theme and must be suitable in subject matter for a diverse and general audience.

Your entries must be submitted online by emailing a jpg copy of the image to submissions@morganhill-photographyclub.org no later than 9:00_{PM} Tuesday, September 5, 2017. Resize your image to be 1920 pixels on the longest side. The Gallery Show Committee will only accept entries submitted via email, at the correct size, and which are received before the deadline. NOTE: You should receive an email acknowledgement that we have received your submission within 48 hours. If

you do not, please use our <u>contact form</u> to report the situation to the Gallery Show Committee.

Each MHPC member may submit up to three (3) works for review by the selection committee. If submiting more than one image, the probability of selection will be increased if the

images are of different subjects. The photographs must be the original work of the photographer, have been captured by a digital or film photographic process, be framed or mounted (mandatory), and have not been in a previous MHPC exhibition. The minimum size of accepted photographs is 8"x10" (exclusive of the mat and/ or frame).

IMPORTANT: Due to the limited space in this venue and the club's desire to have as many members

participate and display as many images as possible, your frame cannot be more than 24 inches (size of glass/mount/mat) in the horizontal direction. See the exhibition rules for more information.


