Editor's Note

few weeks ago I was doing my husbandly duties, against my will, shopping mindlessly at Costco with a list in hand. Bread, bananas, coffee... The first area you see upon entering a Costco is electronics. Now we're talking. I always go up and down each aisle to see the unnecessary items I just must have, for whatever have means. In the realm of cameras, one will usually observe Canon simple, or Nikon entry level, no thanks.

On this day though, a Fujifilm FinePix XP130 caught my eye. This was not an ordinary camera, by no means, this camera had a 16MBSI–CMOS, 5x zoom, 23mm... I didn't care about that, it was nothing new. What caught my attention was that it was shockproof to 5.8 feet, freeze proof to 14° F, but mostly, waterproof down to 65 feet. That's right, 65 feet!

I love riding my bike, in a painful sort of way, but have been considering doing both cycling and photography at the same time. Also, I ride in the rain, or through small ditches of water, so water proof is a must. So, where do I start? Myself, once a professional road racer "roadie", I strive to race again. I cannot help myself. Most people I know in the area of cycling are racers, past racers, coaches, referees, and true race knowledgeable bike shop owners are rare, no help from these people, and I never speak with the wankers. I decided to try some surfing: Googled, "the problems with trying to photograph while cycling" along with a few other similar searches. My intent was to get the views from racers or past racers that attempted to photograph during a ride. Nothing.

Those areas discovered by Google did provide a few ideas and experiences of photographing during a cycling "adventure" or "tour," and no, not the Tour of California, or the Tour de France. The worst page found was titled, "Beauty of the slow ride: One man's year-long cycling adventure around the world" where the rider discussed his photograph pleasures during his rides (slow and riding are two words that cannot match). A number of tips were found in regards to photography while cycling, and some were not too bad:

Shoot on the move. Photograph at a normal pace, in order to provide the viewer a natural feel of the riders.

Think in sets. In my rides I have encountered isolated wannabe cowboys, and total pot smoking, plus other items, hippies. More than once, and don't ask me why, I've stopped and spoken with these individuals, very interesting sets.

Move around. In other words, get my butt out of the saddle.

Take care of your equipment. I place the camera in a jersey pocket and hope for the best.

Bring a small tripod. No. A jersey pocket does not coincide with a tripod, no matter how small.

Well, that was easy to state, now following through? Maybe, maybe not.

Earlier this year, I was driving around, excuse me, driven around, many, many parts of the South Bay. My youngest son had just received an old, but well kept car. "Hey, Seth, it's four-thirty in the afternoon, and we're in Palo Alto. Let's head home!" Heavy traffic, normal traffic, twisty roads, he needed

to learn it all. One area where he lacked was in handling, or knowing the true feel of the car, through turns, lane changes, and the like. I had him drive me up to Henry Coe Park, Lick Observatory, and, the best, the new, vehicle accessible, Mount Umunhum (never heard of it, then look it up online and go!). I have ridden (trained) myself up to Mount Umunhum, maybe fifty, sixty, or more times,



but all on my bike; the pain, faster, gotta beat my best time, steeper part around this turn, need to get out of the saddle... I never truly enjoyed these areas as a normal person would, just enjoyed the pain I placed upon myself, all in order to bring greater pain to my competitors in next weekend's racing. All the climb delivered was the pain.

During our drive up Mount Umunhum, I hadn't ridden my bike in almost two months, knee injury, so I was at a point where I was able to take a deep breath and truly enjoy the scenery since Seth had mastered the road by this time. Enjoy? Mount Umunhum? My first ride up Mount Umunhum was in 1983, and, finally, for the first time, I was enjoying the scenery. I kept shaking my head in disbelief that I have never enjoyed the scenery up to the top, where, upon arrival, the sun was about to set, and, of course, I didn't bring my camera. Next time.

My knee has been repaired and last Wednesday I set a record and rode a total of two-and-a-half hours (used to be a rest day ride), and needed a short rest after two hours. Stating that you took a rest during a ride is despicable, but I forced myself to stop. At two hours, while riding past a lake, just south of Watsonville/Monterey Roads (you can't drive there), I hopped

a fence and was about to enter a home area again, and noticed the American Flag stuck inside a dirt hole barely holding up an ancient, wooden, barbed wire fence post. A flag shoot! The photographs were okay, at best, and I didn't get out of the saddle, or use much brain power in the process. Regardless of those last two errors, I finally did it! Let me tell you this, I received a bit of satisfaction photographing the flag. I accomplished the impossible!



Now I need your help. This weekend, during a ride, I photographed a set of people playing volleyball at a local park. People are easy, but landscapes are not my forte. Forte or not, I want to truly focus landscapes and discover if it is an area that might spark my interest a tad bit more than it has in the past. How do I begin to master landscape photography (nobody truly "masters" anything as there is always room for improvement)? So, who is the best landscape photographer in the club? I shall succeed. I must meet my master.


















UPCOMING MORGAN HILL PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB SAFARIS
